What To Do



Introduce students to the Roadtrip Nation Leader, play the Leader interview, and facilitate a discussion about the interview.

Big Idea

Each Leader's story shows students how they can combine their Interests to create greater academic and career possibilities. Each Leader also gives insights into complex themes like shedding The Noise, overcoming financial hardship, or dealing with self-doubt.

Tips and Tricks

- 1. Each Leader interview is designed to spark conversations on three topics:
 - Future aspirations, including career and academic pursuits
 - Students' Interests
 - Themes from the Road
- The lesson will guide you through key points in the Leader's story and the **Interview Breakdown** includes questions you can use to start conversations on the topics above.
 - **1. Meet the Leader:** Introduce the Leader by sharing the Leader collage, name, and career information with your students.
 - **2. Leader Quote:** Display the Leader quote on the projector. Ask students to discuss or respond in writing to the following question:

Which do you think is harder, getting to know yourself or standing out from the crowd?

- **3. Ask the Leader:** Read the Leader biography or pass out copies to students to read individually. Ask students to create an interview question for Ann based on her biography. Call on students to share their interview questions and record them on chart paper or on the board.
- **4. The Interview:** Play the Leader interview on the projector. If students have their own computers and headphones, they can watch the video individually if you provide the link.
- **5. Interview Breakdown:** Have students address these questions with a partner, in small groups, or through written response.

What are some possible companies Ann could work for as a rock journalist?

How did you spend your free time as a young child? How could you translate that hobby into an Interest you can explore?

Why do you think Ann was willing to accept "dedicated poverty" if it meant she could pursue her Interests?

6. Wrap Up: Revisit the Leader questions from the beginning of the lesson. Review the questions with the class, asking them to answer the questions based on the information from the interview.
